


The UK wide and local picture

In February 2020, we reached our goal of delivering Speak out Stay safe into **90%** of primary schools across the UK.

Since the programme launched in 2011, we have reached **22,150 schools** at least once across 215 LEAs.

We continue to adapt our messages and materials so we can support children to stay safe.



Speak out Stay safe programme

Our programme helps children learn and remember:

- The different ways a child can be hurt by others.
- Every child has the right to speak out and stay safe.
- Making a child feel sad, scared or worried is never OK and is never their fault.
- If they're ever worried they know who to talk to, to get help.

- Ages 7-11




There are bilingual Welsh and BSL versions available as well.



Workshop for ages 9-11

In areas where we have volunteer capacity we are able to offer a volunteer led face to face workshop for children aged 9-11.



The workshop is an hour and covers:

- Recap of the ages 7-11 virtual assembly.
- An ok/not ok activity focussed on sexual abuse.
- Guy's story activity focussed on neglect.
- Speak out Stay safe kit activity.

Workshop for ages 6-7

In areas where we have volunteer capacity we are able to offer a volunteer led face to face workshop for children aged 6-7.



The workshop is half an hour and covers:


- Recap of the ages 5-7 virtual assembly.

- Sam's story and feelings.
- Safe adults group work.
- Buddy Kit activity.

Speak out Stay safe SEND/ASN/ALN

6 session flexible programme to help your pupils understand what abuse is and provide them with strategies to keep themselves safe - including trusted/safe adults.

- Materials intended for children with moderate learning disabilities, autism spectrum conditions or other additional learning needs.
- Schools with pupils with severe, complex and profound disabilities have successfully adapted and delivered the programme.
- Programme is adaptable to meet the needs of your pupils, delivered by school staff with our support.
- Each session has a summary sheet, lesson plan, list of resources, scripts for stories and additional activities to support learning.
- The programme fits with the curriculum.
- You can also use our virtual assembly to support the programme.

The Childline website has an accessibility tool too, you can find out about it by clicking on the accessibility link in the 'Get Support' menu. Children can use it to:

- Read the website out to them
- Change the text size and font
- Change webpages to just text only
- Add a mask or ruler to help you focus on just part of the page
- Magnify parts of the webpage
- Translate the website in to over 120 languages



NSPCC Helpline

If you have any concerns at all about a child's safety or wellbeing, don't hesitate to contact the NSPCC Helpline.

It's never too soon to speak out when a child needs help, and whatever it is you're worried about, our dedicated NSPCC child protection specialists will be able to advise and take any necessary action.

It doesn't have to be an emergency. In fact, every day roughly half of all the calls and messages taken by our friendly team are for guidance and support. This is across a huge range of issues affecting children – from health concerns and relationship difficulties, to bullying and problems on social media.

Look, Say, Sing, Play

Look, Say, Sing, Play is a set of resources which encourage interaction between parents and their babies. Parents and carers interact with their babies all the time without always realising how those interactions shape the way their baby's brain develops. Improving interaction and encouraging parents to be more sensitive to their baby's cues helps parents identify and respond to their needs. It also improves sensitivity of parents from an early stage, setting up positive behaviour as their child grows.
