Hate Crime Awareness Workshops (Schools)

Hate crime and discrimination at school can have a huge impact on students, from lowering attendance and educational outcomes to mental health issues and community tensions. Therefore, it is essential for them to know the ways they can protect themselves and others around them from the harms of hate.

Our Hate Crime Workshops:

Our workshops are specifically designed for students and include a general introduction to hate crime including current statistics. They cover various strands of hate crime and their impacts on the communities. The sessions also have a special focus on learning various methods of challenging and reporting hate crime.

Time duration: 60 minutes

Suitable for: 35 to 40 students per session

Learning activities:

- A detailed presentation on discrimination and hate crime.
- Detailed discussions on five centrally monitored strands of hate crime.
- Online safety and reporting hate crime on social media websites.
- The importance of challenging and reporting hate crime.
- Barriers to reporting hate crime.
- Various reporting and support channels available in the UK

We offer:

Workshops for students (Y6 and onwards) (60 min)

Awareness raising sessions for teachers (60 min)

Students reached:

Over 3,000 pupils in schools have been benefited from these free workshops.
