
# The Circuit Character Set of the National Defibrillator Network




### Introduction

- The Circuit is the UK's national defibrillator network
- Its primary aim is to locate and register the UK's defibrillators, so ambulance services can direct bystanders to access their nearest emergency ready defibrillator during a cardiac arrest
- Its secondary aim is to provide data that identifies where more defibrillators are needed, to support research and policy making
- The Circuit empowers defibrillator Guardians, allowing them to register their defibs and maintain their defib data by providing information and support

# Why it's important to register

Registering your defibrillator on The Circuit helps emergency call handlers locate the nearest defibrillator, when 999 is called in the ultimate medical emergency. At a time when every second counts - it could make the difference between life and death.















# Why it's important to register



Each year, over 30,000 people have an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest. The survival rate for an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest is less than 1 in 10.

Less than 10% of out of hospital cardiac arrests receive bystander defibrillation. Every minute without CPR and defibrillation reduces the chance of survival by up to 10 percent.

It takes less than 5 minutes to register a defibrillator.














### We need your help

It is estimated that tens of thousands of defibrillators are still unknown to the ambulance services.















# Registered defibrillator distribution








# Impact on health inequalities How school registered sites can help – focused area - Liverpool

The National Defibrillator Network


- Liverpool local authority area currently has 275 defibrillators registered on The Circuit
- Liverpool has one of the lowest number of defibrillators per 10,000 in England at only <u>5.4</u> defibrillators per 10,000 population



# Impact on health inequalities How school registered sites can help – focused area Liverpool




- 49% of Lower Super Output Areas (LSOAs) in Liverpool are in the <u>10% most deprived</u> areas in England
- Only 16% of LSOA's are in the top 50% least deprived areas in England
- The Circuit data has shown that areas of <u>greater</u> <u>deprivation have less</u> <u>accessibility to defibrillators</u>











Mean time for retrieval of defibrillator: 8.0 minutes

Current situation + 25% of DfE school sites registered (n = 34)




Mean time for retrieval of defibrillator: 7.3 minutes

Current situation + 50% of DfE school registered (n = 68)



Mean time for retrieval of defibrillator: 6.8 minutes

Current situation + 75% of DfE school registered (n = 101)




Mean time for retrieval of defibrillator: 6.2 minutes

Impact on health inequalities



# Impact on health inequalities



How school registered sites can help – reduction in return time to retrieve a defibrillator in Liverpool

- If 100% of DfE school sites that received a defibrillator (n = 135) have their defibrillator registered the mean time to retrieve a defibrillator in Liverpool would be 5.8 minutes
- Increase in the number of defibrillators per 10,000 from 5.4 defibrillators per 10,000 population to 8.4 defibrillators per 10,000 in Liverpool



#### **Schools**

- Only 5 local authorities have greater than 50% of schools register their DfE supplied defibrillator
- Poor registration in the North-West particularly in and around Liverpool (only 9 schools out of 158), as well as Norfolk, Yorkshire, Midlands and South-West

### **FAQs**

#### Does my defibrillator need to be available 24/7 to register?

No - they don't We recommend that defibs are placed outside in unlocked cabinets available 24/7 where possible.

However, defibrillators can be registered for the hours and periods that they are available. Whether shop hours, school time – it could still make the difference for someone and their loved ones

#### How often do I need to check the defib?

We recommend that you check that your defibrillator is emergency ready at least once every three months.

#### Can I share the responsibility of looking after the defibrillator with someone else?

Yes you can. One person should be recorded as the lead Guardian however there the opportunity to assign a support Guardian.
