
M Intelligence Flow & Custody Trends

AXIS has noted a seasonal dip in intelligence submissions which is an expected outcome during the summer holidays as schools are usually a key source of information. Despite this, the period has seen a **notable rise in children entering police custody**, with offences ranging from **robbery and serious assaults to sexual offences**. Many of these young people are now on **police bail with risk-managed conditions**. Of particular concern is the **increased involvement of girls**, both as suspects and in custody cases which is an evolving trend that may warrant gender-informed intervention strategies.

Geographic Risk Concentration

A heat map analysis highlights **Hayes Town and Uxbridge** as emerging hotspots. Of the 20 children flagged for ASB or SYV, 8 are from these areas signalling the need for intensified localised action.

<u> 🔥 Serious Youth Violence (SYV) & Antisocial Behaviour (ASB)</u>

ASB incidents continue to **decline** from 46 children in the last bulletin to just 20 this period.

SYV remains the Borough's primary concern, though numbers have dropped from 88 to 58.

Robberies, particularly of mobile phones, remain a key SYV trigger.

AXIS has observed a rise in girls as SYV suspects, often involving partner assaults or resistance during arrest.

86% of SYV cases involve boys, reinforcing the need for targeted malefocused interventions.

SYV Response Highlights

A **Knife Amnesty Bin** was installed at Pump Lane Car Park, Hayes and this was well received by the community.

On **8th July**, the **Faz Amnesty Van** visited the same location, enabling young people to surrender weapons. The initiative was a resounding success, strengthening community trust.





Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) & VAWG

11 children were flagged for CSE-related concerns, down slightly from 12.

80% of intelligence relates to girls, with 5 linked to VAWG incidents.

AXIS has seen a **rise in sexual assaults on girls**, often linked to **domestic violence**.

A disturbing case involved an **older male grooming girls with drugs/alcohol**, including inappropriate contact.

TikTok and Snapchat remain the most cited platforms for grooming and image distribution.

Ofcom's Online Safety Measures, mandated by the Online Safety Act, require tech companies to implement effective age checks on potentially harmful content like Pornography, filter harmful materia from children's feeds and quickly tackle harmful content when detected. This is a **positive step** in the right direction towards reducing exposure to harmful material, such a violent, hateful or abusive content.

Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE Response)

CSE remains a standing agenda item across strategic panels e.g. Operational High Risk Panel, MAROTH.

AXIS continues to collaborate with the **Metropolitan Police CSE Lead** and **KISS (Sexual Health Service) to address CSE**.

Primary school CSE sessions have been delivered with age-appropriate content and excellent feedback.

Drugs: Trends & Emerging Themes

33 children were linked to drug-related incidents (up from 11).

Hayes remains the primary concern area in relation to drug related incidents as 10 of the drugs related incidents occurred within Hayes. Areas such as West Drayton/Yiewsley had only 3 drug related incidents.

Cannabis and Class A substances dominate, with cannabis mostly for personal use, as in 8 Cannabis incidents the child was also in possession of a grinder.

Nitrous oxide, balloons, and codeine were repeatedly mentioned in the intelligence pieces.

The **15–17 age group** is most affected, though the youngest case involved a **12-year-old**.

County Lines

There has been 1 mention of **County Lines** since the last edition of the Bulletin. This was linked to a **MISSING** episode. This involved a 17yr old child, who was located in the Bucks area.

Drug Response

AXIS is scaling up **awareness workshops** in schools and hospitals, with full recommencement in September.

Ongoing partnership with **SORTED** (the council's One-to-one mentoring and counselling around drugs and alcohol education for 11 to 19-year-olds) ensures wraparound support for young people facing substance misuse.

Missing Persons (MISPER)

20 children were reported missing; 60% were girls during this reporting period.

Most were aged 16–17, with **Uxbridge, Cowley, and Hayes** as key locations that the children were linked with.

3 long-term cases (including one over 12 weeks) triggered a multistakeholder action to respond to the missing episodes in line with the missing procedure.

Common themes: being "out with friends/boyfriends" and travel to London.

Looked After Children (LAC) are frequently reported missing due to curfew breaches, returning home late or family visits. AXIS intelligence suggests that 90% of missing episodes reported related to a child who is LAC.

MISPER Response

AXIS continues to work closely with **police**, **social care**, **and Youth Justice Services**, ensuring rapid information sharing and coordinated action to reduce harm.

Making Hayes Safer: Community Action Day

On 15th August, a powerful anti-knife crime event was held at Botwell Library, funded by the Making Hayes Safer initiative. In partnership with The Teen Room, Communities Against Violence (CAV), and residents:

- Over 300 attendees participated.
- Talks from Andrew Fuller, Faron Paul, and Quinton Milise inspired young people.
- A **celebrity chef served 100 free meals**. This event showcased the strength of community-led safety efforts and the power of partnership.
